

Leather Value Chain Glossary

The below glossary has been compiled with reference to the ISO Leather – Vocabulary¹, along with other documents and reports that have been prepared as part of the UNECE Project to advance transparency and traceability of sustainable value chains in the garment and footwear sector. Terms and definitions are listed here to ensure harmonisation and standardisation for the industry stakeholders within the project

chrome-free leather	<material> hide or skin converted to leather by a tanning agent free of chromium</material>

chrome-tanned leather	<material> hide or skin converted to leather either by treatment solely with</material>
	chromium salts or with chromium salts together with a small amount of some other

	sufficient amount to alter the essential chromium tanner character of the leather
CITES	<organisation> Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild</organisation>

coated and coated split leather	<material> leather and split leather where the surface coating, applied to the outer side, does not exceed one third of the total thickness of the product but is in excess of 0.15 mm</material>
corrected grain leather	<material> leather in which the <i>grain</i> has been partially removed by <i>buffing</i> or any similar mechanical treatment, and enhanced by a <i>finishing</i> treatment</material>
crust	<material> leather in a partially finished state, i.e. tanned, retanned, fatliquored or dyed which has then been dried for storage or sale until the end finishing requirement is known</material>
dyed crust leather pearl crust leather	<material> leather tanned, dyed, fatliquored and dried, before finishing <material> undyed leather that has been tanned, retanned, fatliquored and dried, before finishing</material></material>

degree of tannage	<chemical characteristic=""> amount of fixed organic matter in 100g of collagen</chemical>

double face	<material> double-sided leather made from lamb or sheep skins or other animals with wool, dressed, tanned, softened and dyed for desired properties.</material>
drum	<equipment> cylindrical vessel with baffles inside and capable of rotation about its own axis, used for mechanical agitation in leather processing</equipment>
dry drumming	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
dry salting	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre>dried</pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
dyed crust leather	<material> leather tanned, dyed, fatliquored and dried, before finishing</material>
effluent	<material> liquid waste discharged from a tannery following production processes that can be treated to remove contaminants and discharged direct to rivers or seas, or left untreated and sent to an Effluent Treatment Plant</material>
effluent treatment plant	<pre><place> where industrial liquid waste from tanneries is sent to be cleaned of harmful chemicals before discharge into the environment or being sent back to the tanner for reuse</place></pre>
common effluent treatment plant (CETP)	<pre><place> a treatment plant that is run by a private organisation or a group of organisations and where the effluent from many industries can be treated or just tannery effluent</place></pre>
municipal effluent treatment plant (METP)	<pre><place> a treatment plant that is government run and could involve a mix of industrial and domestic effluent to be cleaned before discharge back into the environment</place></pre>
E.I. leather (East India leather)	<material> vegetable-tanned leather with characteristic light beige or pale golden yellow colour manufactured by a process specific to a geographical location</material>
exotic leather	<material> made from the skins of animals that are not generally reared for diary and meat production or animals that are considered rare, e.g. lizard, snake, ostrich</material>
fatliqour	<material> natural or synthetic oil-based formulation that can be an emulsion, solution or dispersion used to lubricate leather fibres</material>
fatliquoring	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre>application of fatliquors for lubricating and softening leathers</pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
finishing	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>

full grain leather	<material> leather having kept its entire <i>grain</i>, with none of the surface removed by any corrective mechanical treatment</material>
glazing	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
grain	<material> outer side of the leather once the hair or wool and epidermis have been removed, characterised by follicles from hair or wool, feather follicles or scales, specific to each animal species</material>
hide	<material> raw skin or a mature or fully-grown animal of the larger kind, e.g. cattle and buffalo</material>
hide powder	<material> powder from well-washed, dried, delimed <i>pelt</i> disintegrated using a grinding mill</material>
hide substance	<material> amount of collagenous substance in 100g of dry leather</material>
industrial farm system	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre>farm (feedlot)</pre>, and is commonly used for large volume meat production</pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
birthing farm (cow/calf farm)	<place> where calves are born and stay with their mothers until they are weaned</place>
rearing farm (raising farm)	<pre><place> where young animals are sent to continue to grow to a pre-determined age/weight</place></pre>
finishing farm (feedlot)	<pre><place> where cattle spend the last 4 months of life (approximately), prior to slaughter, to ensure optimum weight and health for meat production</place></pre>
laminated leather	<material> leather where a foil (polymeric film) layer, not exceeding one third of the total thickness, is applied by a transfer coating process NB1: other methods of applying a foil are plating, embossing and ironing</material>
leather	<material> hide or skin with its original fibrous structure more or less intact, tanned to be imputrescible (not liable to decomposition), where the hair or wool may or may not have been removed, whether or not the hide or skin has been split into layers or segmented either before or after tanning and where any surface coating or surface layer, however applied, is not thicker than 0.15 mm NB1: If the tanned hide or skin is disintegrated mechanically and/or chemically into fibrous particles, small pieces or powders, and is then, with or without the combination of a binding agent, made into sheets or other forms, such sheets or forms are not leather NB2: If the grain layer has been completely removed, the term leather is not to be used without further qualification, e.g. split leather, suede leather NB3: The material shall be of animal origin</material>

loose grain	<physical characteristic=""> grain whose attachment to corium has been eroded, giving rise to pronounced wrinkles when leather is bent, grain inside</physical>
masking agent	<material> weak acids and their salts added during mineral tanning to prevent precipitation of tanning salts</material>
metal-free leather	<material> hide or skin converted to leather, where the total content of all tanning metals (Cr, Al, Ti, Zr, Fe) in the leather is less than or qual to 0.1% (mass of all metal/total dry weight of leather)</material>
milling	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
nap	<material> vertical and fine fibres cut short enough to produce a velvety two-tone effect when a two-way stroke is applied by hand</material>
парра	<material> soft full grain leather through dyed and lightly finished</material>
nappalan	<material> wool-on-sheepskin, finished by coating on the reverse side</material>
nappalan finish	<physical characteristic=""> finishing on the flesh side of hides and skins</physical>
neutralization	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>



nubuck	<material> leather snuffed (buffed) to give a velvety effect, where the original grain pattern is still visible</material>
organic-tanned leather	<material> hide or skin converted to leather by natural or synthetic organic tanning agents, where the total content of tanning metals (Cr, Al, Ti, Zr, Fe) is less than or qual to 0.3% (mass of all metals/total dry weight of leather)</material>
parchment	<material> dry, translucent or opaque untanned hide or skin material</material>
patent leather	<material> leather with generally a mirror-like effect, obtained by application of a layer of pigmented or non-pigmented varnishes, or synthetic resins, whose thickness does not exceed one third of the total thickness of the product NB1: the term patent split leather also exists NB2: varnishes and lacquers are usually based on linseed oil, nitrocellulose, polyurethane and/or other synthetic resins.</material>
pelt	<material> hide or skin prepared for tanning by removal of the hair of the wool, epidermis and flesh NB1: the term pelt can also be used for the skin of an animal with fur or hair still on it</material>
pickling	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
pigmented leather	<material> leather whose natural grain or surface is completely concealed with a finish containing pigments</material>
pull-up leather	<material> leather that, by design, lightens in colour when stretched</material>
raw hide	<material> hide which has only been treated to preserve it</material>
sammying (samming)	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
scudding	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
semi-aniline leather	<material> leather that has been coated with a <i>finish</i> containing a small amount of pigment, so that the natural <i>grain</i> is clearly visible</material>
semi-chrome leather	<material> leather that has been tanned first with vegetable tanning and then retanned with chromium salts</material>
setting	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
shaving	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
shearling	<material> tanned and dressed skin of a sheep still bearing the original wool that has been cut to approximately even length</material>
shrunken grain leather	<material> leather specifically tanned so as to shrink the <i>grain</i> layer, with a grain surface of prominent but uneven folds and valleys</material>
side	<material> half of a whole hide, obtained by dividing it along the line of the backbone</material>
skin	<material> outer covering of smaller types of animals, e.g. sheep and goats, or of the immature animals of the larger species, e.g. calves</material>
skiver	<material> tanned outer or grain split, typically of a sheepskin or lambskin, but sometimes applied to goatskin or calfskin</material>
snuffing	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
soaking	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
spew (spue)	<material> white surface deposition emanating from the leather</material>
split leather	<material> layer from a hide or skin made from a flesh split or a middle split, without any grain structure, tanned to be imputrescible NB1: a split is a layer of hide or skin obtained by dividing it horizontally (splitting) to obtain at least two separate layers; the top layer is call grain split and the bottom layer is called flesh split; for heavy hides a middle split can also be obtained</material>



	NB2: if the name of the animal whence it originates, or the part of the animal whence it comes, is included in the description, the term "split leather" will be used as a noun, e.g. pig split leather
grain split	<material> upper or top layer of a <i>hide</i> or <i>skin</i> with grain surface, separated from</material>
	the <i>hide</i> or <i>skin</i> by splitting horizontally in a machine
flesh split	<material> inner of under layer of a hide or skin with grain surface, separated from</material>
jiesii spiic	the <i>hide</i> or <i>skin</i> by splitting horizontally in a machine
middle split	<material> middle layer of a hide or skin with grain surface, separated from the hide</material>
aa.e spiie	or skin by splitting horizontally in a machine

sub-contractor	<organisation> provides a transformation process on behalf of a tannery without</organisation>

suede (velour)	<material> leather or split leather whose wearing surface has been mechanically</material>
	finished to produce a velvet-like nap
T/NT ratio	<chemical characteristic=""> ratio of tannins to non-tannins in a vegetable tanning</chemical>

tannery	<place> a place where the process of leather manufacture occurs</place>
	NB1: tanneries may perform the whole transformation process from raw hide to
	finished leather or may perform a part process

wet-blue	<material> leather in a wet condition after chrome tanning</material>
	NB1: Wet-blue is an intermediate stage of manufacturing
wet salting	<pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre><pre>so that</pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre></pre>
	the product remains wet
wet-white	<material> leather in a wet condition after tanning with substances, e.g. zirconium</material>
	salts, aluminium salts, modified aldehydes, glutaraldehydes and syntans, that confer
	a whitish colour
	NB1: Wet-white is an intermediate stage of manufacturing
